4-H FAIR TIME SPORTSMANSHIP

- 1. <u>Conduct.</u> Display and maintain high standards of personal behavior which is becoming to you as an individual and as a representative of your family, your club, your community, or any other program you are a part of.
- 2. **Fairness**. Learn and follow the rules. Do not cheat. Be impartial and honest at all times.
- 3. **Honesty**. Show integrity. Do not lie or deceive. Do your own work. Do not understate or overstate your abilities, skills or accomplishments.
- 4. **Competition**. Rivalry is a part of competition. There are winners and losers in every contest. Be respectful, considerate, cooperative, and cheerful in your attitude and behavior, regardless of whether you win or lose.
- 5. **Courtesy.** Questions are fine and suggestions are welcome, but be respectful in expressing them. Be pleasant toward other participants, spectators, program officials, extension staff, fair board, media, 4-H leaders, and especially your parents. Give others the benefit of the doubt.
- 6. **Respect.** Do not argue with our judges. Their opinions are the most important the day of the judging, and if you are prepared and have done your own work, you will succeed! Accept suggestions and comments with a positive attitude. If you receive a lower placing than expected, be gracious and learn from the experience.
- 7. Kindness. Treat animals, people and property kindly and with respect.
- 8. **Spirit**. Congratulate those who win after a competition! Recognize, appreciate and try to learn from shortcomings. Do not protest, or make accusations unless you have proof and are willing to personally face the person you are accusing.
- 9. **Graciousness**. If you are named the winner, graciously thank the people who recognized you. Do not gloat, brag or act conceited, or downplay your accomplishment.
- 10. **Gratitude.** THANK YOUR PARENTS, leader, judges, fair board, and the extension staff. They have gone to a lot of work for you and the county to put on a successful fair.

GENERAL 4-H RULES

RULE I - Interpretations, Amendments & Violations

- 1. The Golden Prairie Extension District reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settleall questions arising in connection with 4-H exhibits.
- 2. In the event of a conflict regarding 4-H members, 4-H projects, or 4-H events occurring during the county fair, thematter will be turned over to a grievance committee. (See Rule IV)
- 3. Any person who violates any general or special rule willforfeit all privileges and premiums.

RULE II - Entry Requirements.

- 1. All 4-H entries to the county fair are free, exceptShooting Sports Shoot, Dog, and Horse.
- 2. All property entered at the fair for any purpose shall besubject to the control of the superintendent in charge.
- 3. All 4-H entries must be pre-entered with the ExtensionOffice.

RULE III - Exhibit Duties & Privileges.

- 1. Only members of 4-H clubs in Logan County may exhibit in 4-H competitions. Logan County 4-H members and Logan County open class exhibitors shall have priorityover non-residents for livestock exhibiting space. Exhibitscannot be entered in both open class and 4-H competitionwith the exception of the open class and 4-H dog and horse shows.
- 2. If any exhibitor has made any false statement in regardto any exhibit or if any exhibitor shall attempt to interfere with the judging process, he shall be excluded from all competition or exhibition on the grounds and any awards that he/she may have received will be forfeited at the discretion of the Golden Prairie District Executive Board.
- 3. The decision of the judges shall be final and no appealwill be considered except in cases of rare protests.

RULE IV - Grievances

Filing a grievance-

Talk to the Superintendent in that area - if you feel it is notresolved, then put the grievance in writing, sign, and submit it to Extension Staff. This must be done within 24 hours of the incident, otherwise it is not a valid complaint. Within 24 hours of the complaint being filed a ruling will bemade.

The Grievance committee will consist of the superintendent of that project area, Extension Board Chair, 1- extension board member from Logan County, Logan County Fair Board President, 1- member from Logan County Fair Board, and Extension Staff. The grievance committee ruling will be final. Any violation that affects future participation will be sent to the Golden Prairie District Executive Board.

RULE V - Power and Liabilities of the Extension Executive Board

- 1. The Golden Prairie District Extension Board reserves the right to remove from the grounds any 4-H exhibit or animals that may be falsely entered, or may be deemed unsuitable or objectionable, or to remove any sign, banner, identification mark or signature or advertising matter of anykind which may be deemed objectionable.
- 2. All 4-H and open class animals will be checked-in underthe supervision of a veterinarian. No diseased animal or fowl will be permitted to be exhibited or occupy space at the fair, and every precaution will be taken to enforce this rule. However, the management will not be responsible forany loss or damage that may be sustained through violation of this rule.
- 3. No claim for any injury to any person or property shallbe asserted to suit instituted, or maintained against the Extension Executive Board, its officers or agents, representatives, servants or employees on behalf of anyperson, corporation or firms as a result of damage sustained on the grounds of this fair.

RULE VI - Miscellaneous.

- 1. A superintendent will be appointed for each Division, whose duty it shall be to receive the exhibits, properly classify them and to assist the judges. A junior superintendent will also be assigned to assist. Animal superintendents should be present at 4-H animal check-ins to assist the agents and 4-H'ers.
- 2. All entries except livestock shall be exhibited by using an exhibit card. Open class exhibit cards are available from the Extension Office and in the Fair Office in the DickFarmer Arena. Two cards are required for each exhibit.
- 3. No responsibility will be assumed for loss or damage of any property.
- 4. Premium money will be forfeited if exhibits are removedbefore release time.
- 5. FFA / Vocational agriculture members may exhibitlivestock in the open class division.
- 6. All exhibits are to be entered and in place at least 1 hour before judging is to begin. 4-H members must be properly enrolled in the project they expect to exhibit in. Allexhibits must be work that is completed during the current 4-H year.
- 7. All 4-H exhibits are governed by the general rules of the Golden Prairie District Executive Board.
- 8. Each 4-H exhibit will receive a ribbon placing. Ribbon placings will be made at the discretion of the judges. Theywill be placed into purple, blue, red or white groups with Grand Champion and Reserve Champion awarded if quality is deserving. The purple, or State Fair ribbon, is eligible to enter State Fair competition provided they meet age requirements and a class is provided for State Fair exhibit. All entries must conform to the 4-H project requirements (age, breeding, etc.).
- 9. Prize money will be awarded on a point basis. Point values will be determined by dividing total points awardedinto total prize money available. Points awarded will be: Grand Champion 50, Reserve Champion 45, Purple 40, Blue 30, Red 20, White
- 10. All 4-H members must attend the pre-fair

clean-up/set-up and the post-fair clean-up to receive premium money. These dates will be announced by the Extension Office.

LIVESTOCK

Special Rules For All Livestock:

- 1. Exhibitors are expected to comply with ALL rules. Thosefailing to comply with the rules are subject to premium andaward cancellations and disqualification from current participation in Logan County Fair 4-H shows and/or exhibits.
- 2. Check-ins:
- A. All livestock must be checked-in and/or tagged at spring check-in. County check in dates and times will be set by Extension personnel, and there will be no exceptions or late check-ins after the schedule has been set and publicized, excluding hardship cases at the discretion of the Extension Office. All animals shown in 4-H classes must have a form of permanent, non- reproducible identification in place at spring check-in or betagged with a Kansas 4-H ear-tag. Exceptions include heifers under six months at fair not shown as bucket calves, and calves from cow/calf pairs. Cows from cow/calf pairs must be checked in or reported to the Extension Agent at spring check-in.
- B. All sheep and goats must have a USDA Scrapies tagbefore fair. Breeding ewes and goats do not have to have a 4-H ear-tag if they are exhibiting a Scrapies tag at springcheck-in because the Scrapies tag will be used as their non-reproducible permanent identification.
- C. Breeding heifers exhibiting a Brucellosis or "bangs" tag at spring check-in will not be required to have a 4-Hear-tag because their Brucellosis or "bangs" tag will be used as their non-reproducible permanent identification.
 - D. Tattoos and ear-notches are not a form of non-reproducible permanent identification.
 - E. All 4-H market animals must have a Kansas 4-H ear-tag put in at spring check-in.
- 3. A herdsmanship certificate will be awarded to a 4-H livestock exhibitor and to a 4-H club. This certificate is based on clean and neat stalls, courtesy shown to judge,other exhibitors and the public; manners; personal appearance; attitude; etc. A qualified individual or committee will make this selection.
- 4. Exhibitors must furnish feed and feeding facilities for livestock. All exhibitors should keep allotted space clean atall times. No premium will be paid until livestock exhibitors have cleaned their stalls and barns. Water must be adequately supplied to animals to eliminate risk of heat stress.
- 5. All livestock must be checked in by Extension staff and checked by a veterinarian at the fairgrounds by 8:00pm on checkin day. All market animals must be weighed-in. Official weigh-in times for ALL livestock projects will be at 7:30-10:30 AM on **Tuesday**, **July 29**, **2025**. Only one weight will be taken per animal during the official weigh-in time. No official weights will be taken without Extension personnel present. 4-H members who wish check animal weights before the official weigh-in time must contact the Logan County Fair Board regarding use of the scales.
- 6. All adults, including parents and grandparents, must remain outside of the show ring and at least 10 feet away while animals are being judged. Parents and observers are not allowed to coach exhibitors once judging of a class has begun and will receive only 1 verbal warning. Dismissal from judging could result. This rule applies toexhibition of all livestock, horses, dogs, cats, poultry andrabbits.
- 7. All animals brought must be drug free. Exhibitors maybe required to sign an agreement stating animals are free of any and all drugs.
- 8. Guidelines for tranquilizing of animals:
- A. Animals may be tranquilized only after approval is secured from the Livestock Superintendent(s), Agent and Fair Board.
- B. The Extension Agent and a Fair Board member need to be present for all medical treatment or additive, other than normal feed.
- 9. If the animal must be tied to the fence or placed in a penduring showmanship, it will be placed last in that class.
- 10. Each exhibitor must care for and groom his or her ownanimal and may use only the assistance of an immediate family member (mother, father, legal guardian, brother or sister) or another current Kansas 4-H member who is an exhibitor at this year's livestock show.
- A. All Livestock Shows will be "Blow and Go" shows. "Blow and Go" at the Logan County Fair is defined as using NO adhesive, glue, artificial coloring, paint, or powder products. Any product used must be water-soluble, nothing stiff or sticky. Cattle may be clipped and blow dried. Conditioners and hoof products may be used. Those failing to adhere to the "Blow and Go" rule is subject to premium and award cancellations and disqualification from current participation in Logan County Fair 4-H shows and/or exhibits.
- 11. **EXHIBITORS MUST ENTER SHOWMANSHIP CLASSTO BE ELIGIBLE TO SELL AT THE 4-H SALE.** Showmanship class will be the first class in each Division. The contest will be divided into 3 age groups: Senior age 14 and over; intermediate age 10 to 13; and Junior age 7 to 9. Age is determined as of January 1 of the current year.
- 12. All exhibits must be ready when the class is called. Kansas 4-H members are expected to exhibit their ownanimals and projects. An exhibitor substitution may be allowed only in the following cases:
- Exhibitor is ill/injured; must have physician's orderand be present at the time of show
- Exhibitor has more than one animal entered in thesame species
- Exhibitor has animals simultaneously being judgedin more than one species

Substitute exhibitors must be a current Logan County 4-Hmember experienced with livestock.

- 13. All animals sold in the 4-H livestock auction will be released at 8:00pm on **Friday**, **August 1**, **2025**. Any animal tatis not sold in the livestock auction will be released immediately following the sale.
- 14. Attire for showing and selling of any livestock: long pants, shirts must be tucked in, closed-toe shoes, and **no** t-shirts, caps or hats. If you enter a livestock class or the livestock sale in dirty, torn or unacceptable clothing you willbe disqualified. Exhibitors entering the horse show must dress according tostandards for each class.
- 15. The decision of the judge is final.
- 16. No animals are to be tied to the horse barns. Tie themto the rail or return them to their stalls.
- 17. 2 market animals per division allowed per 4-H'er; 2 steers, 2 heifers, 2 hogs, 2 lambs, 2 goats, 2 pens of broilers and 2 pens of meat rabbits per youth. This doesnot apply to bucket calves or breeding livestock.
- 18. All animals must meet Kansas Division of AnimalHealth requirements. (See page 15)

Livestock Sale Rules:

- 1. Each 4-H'er will be allowed to sell only 1 animal in each species (one beef, swine, poultry, goats, sheep, bucket calves and rabbit).
- 2. All livestock will be sold by the head.
- 3. There will be no minimum or maximum weight requirements for animals to sell in the livestock auction.
- 4. It is the responsibility of the 4-H'er to designate which animal will be sold if 4-H'er shows more than one animal ofthe same species. Otherwise, the animal with the highest ribbon placing will be sold. If both animals have the same ribbon placing, then the heaviest animal will be sold.
- 5. The Grand Champion animal in each division will be sold first, followed by the Reserve Champion, purple, blue,red, and white ribbon placing.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- It is recommended that all animals be subject to examination by the exhibition staff or their representatives and shall be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease.
- It is recommended that animals determined by exhibition staff to have not met listed requirements and recommendations will not be permitted to exhibit.
- Certificate Of Veterinary Inspection (Health Certificate)
 - Kansas Origin Livestock Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required by Kansas Department of Agriculture – Division of Animal Health (KDA-DAH), but can be required at the discretion of each exhibition event.
 - Livestock Originating From Other States All livestock originating outside of Kansas must meet Kansas import requirements and must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

CATTLE (BEEF, DAIRY) AND BISON

- All cattle and bison must meet the General Requirements.
- It is recommended that cattle determined by exhibition staff to have lesions of ringworm, warts or infested with mange will not be permitted to exhibit.
- Cattle Originating From Other States
 - o All cattle must have official ID, and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI.
 - All dairy cattle require an import permit.
 - o All lactating dairy cattle must have negative HPAI milk test within 7 days of movement.

GOATS

- In addition to the General Requirements, all goats must be:
 - Identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA premises ID tag (Scrapie tag.) Goats identified with registration tattoos must have legible tattoos and must have registration papers for these animals available for inspection.
 - It is recommended that all goats are free of any signs of sore mouth and clinical signs of active fungal (ringworm) infection.
- Goats Originating From Other States
 - All goats must have official ID, and ID must be individually listed on the accompanying CVI.

HORSES

- All horses must meet the General Requirements.
- Kansas Origin Horses A valid VS Form 10-11 showing evidence of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) test conducted by a state-approved laboratory within 12 months prior to exhibition is required by KDA-DAH. Foals six months of age and younger, accompanying their EIA-negative dams, are exempt from EIA test requirements.
- Horses Originating From Other States must be accompanied by a valid VS Form 10-11 showing evidence
 of a negative Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins) test conducted by a state-approved laboratory within
 12 months prior to entry into Kansas. Foals six months of age and younger, accompanying their EIAnegative dams, are exempt from EIA test requirements.

POULTRY

- All poultry must meet the General Requirements.
- Kansas Origin Poultry
 - Kansas continues its designation as a Pullorum-Typhoid (P-T) Clean state.
 - o All poultry (except waterfowl) are required to show proof of being P-T clean by one of the following:
 - Originate from a certified U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock
 - Test negative at check-in of the county fair when the county has been designated by KDA-DAH for surveillance. Routine surveillance testing will be performed for each county fair a minimum of once every 5 years.

- **Poultry Originating From Other States** All poultry (except waterfowl) are required to show proof of being P-T clean by one of the following:
 - o Originate from a certified U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean flock
 - Test negative on a P-T test within 90 days of exhibition
- Additionally, out-of-state poultry must have a "Permit to Ship Poultry or Hatching Eggs" issued by the KDA-DAH within the previous year or a permit number issued by the KDA-DAH office within the previous 15 days.

RABBITS

- All rabbits must meet the General Requirements.
- Rabbits Originating from other States All rabbits originating outside of Kansas must meet Kansas import requirements and must have a valid Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

SHEEP

- In addition to the General Requirements, all sheep must be:
 - Identified with a registered tattoo or an official USDA premises ID tag (Scrapie tag.) Sheep identified with registration tattoos must have legible tattoos and must have registration papers for these animals available for inspection.

BEEF

Special Rules for All Beef Projects:

- 1. Uncontrollable animals may be required to leave the County Fair at the discretion of the Superintendents and Extension Agent and may be excluded from the show and/or sale. It is strongly suggested that an adult be present when 4-H'ers are handling livestock.
- 2. No horns over 1 inch long will be allowed on any cattle or calves exhibited at County Fair. The only exception willbe Horned Hereford Heifers.
- 3. A neck rope is required on all animals while tied.
- 4. All Livestock Shows will be "Blow and Go" shows.

 - A. What the 4-H member learned aboutcaring for and raising the calf.
 - B. Fitting and showing.
 - C. General health and appearance of the calf.
 - D. Placings will be made primarily on the basis of the interview with the exhibitor, not on thequality of the animal.

POULTRY

Special Rules for Poultry:

- 1. Chickens must originate from a Pullorum-Typhoid cleanflock as evidenced by a properly signed form OR present evidence that the entry was purchased from a P-T clean source and are either the only poultry on the premises or have been physically separated from infected flocks OR present properly signed form indicating that the entry has had a negative P-T test within the 90 days prior to the show.
- 2. Premiums will be withheld if poultry is not fed, watered, or if cages are not cleaned daily, as well as if exhibitor fails to clean cages and assist in clean-up on Saturday. Poultrymust be clean and presentable at time of judging.
- 3. All birds must be deloused prior to the show to assist inprevention of the spread of disease and parasites. Do not bring entry if there is sickness in the flock.
- 4. A pen is three commercial production chickens.
- 5. A trio is one male and two females. A young trio is 2 pullets and a cockerel. An old trio is 2 hens and one cock.
- 6. The following dates will be used to determined ages: amale hatched before January 1 Cock; a female hatched before January 1 Hen; a female hatched after January 1 Pullet.
- 7. Members must furnish own feed and watering cup.Pens will be furnished.
- 8. Poultry should be representative of breeds as describedin the APA American Standard of Perfection.

Special Rules for Market Broilers:

- 1. Each exhibitor is limited to 3 pens of market broilers.
- 2. Blue Ribbon winners will be eligible for the State Fair.
- 3. Poultry must be ordered through the Extension Office. Orders must be placed by May 5th. Once orders are placedyou will be held responsible for that order. A minimum order of 25 and a maximum of 50 chicks per exhibitor. The cost will include chicks, vaccinations and postage.
- 4. Poultry will be judged according to the APA Standard.
- 5. Exhibitor is expected to feed and water their own birds.
- 6. Exhibitor should be prepared to provide fan(s) to keepbroilers cool.
- 7. All chicks will be hatched on the same day and will be delivered directly from the hatchery by US Postal Service. All birds

will be from the same genetic source. Thus, the competition will be based solely upon the contestant's management and poultry husbandry skills.

The rider must also have the horse under control before exiting the arena.

Special Rules for Dogs:

Dogs must go home after the judging. 4-H'er only is encouraged to answer and/or ask judge questions.

- 1. Read General Regulations.
- 2. All teams, comprising of 4-H member who are 9-18 years of age and their dog, who meet county qualifications with a qualifying blue or purple in showmanship, obedience, agility, or rally obedience can compete in the State 4-H Dog Show.
- 3. 4-H Dog Show Immunization Record (only MG-34 Revised, October 2017 accepted) must be completed for each dog entered at the county and State 4-H Dog Show. The fully completed form must be presented at check-in to be eligible to compete. Required vaccinations include Bordetella, Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus, Parainfluenza, and Rabies. The rabies vaccination must be administered by a licensed veterinarian. All vaccinations must be current. Dogs must be at least 6 months of age at time of show. (One year old for Agility)
- 4. Any abuse of dogs on grounds, or in the ring, will result in disqualification.
- 5. No dog in season will be allowed to show.
- 6. A well-fitting collar of leather, chain, or fabric is to be used for obedience and Rally Obedience; for Agility, a buckle or snap collar; for Showmanship, a show lead that serves as both collar and lead or a fine link chain collar, a "snake" chain or a fabric slip collar with a narrow, lightweight fabric or leather lead. No spiked, pinch, special training collars, and hanging objects from collars are allowed.
- 7. Any dog fouling the ring will receive a white ribbon. Owners should collect all dog waste in plastic bags and put in trash.
- 8. Baiting dogs is not allowed in the ring.
- 9. No exhibitor mobile phones and/or other electronic devices are allowed in the ring.
- 10. DOGS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO RUN AT LARGE OR ACCOMPANY OWNER ANYWHERE ON FAIR GROUNDS AT ANY TIME.
- 11. The County Fair Show will follow rules as listed in the published Kansas 4-H Dog rule books: Kansas 4-H Dog Show Rules Book (4H 1120 Revised, January, 2023)
- 12. For time constraints, teams receiving a non-qualifying score may be excused from the ring at the show committee's discretion for long performance times (more than 5 minutes) AND repeated failures at obstacles.

Agility Competition

Agility: The purpose of Kansas 4-H Dog Agility is to provide 4-H members the opportunity to demonstrate the teamwork necessary to work under a variety of conditions that challenge both the handler and dog. By teaching a series of obstacles, the 4-H'er provides the basic training and exercise that leads to a more versatile, well-conditioned dog. Different obstacles and courses present unique tests of speed, confidence, technical skills, athleticism, balance, communication, attentiveness, distance, and directional control. The task of leaders, judges, trainers, and handlers is to incorporate all these elements while maintaining a fun, safe environment for the dogs and 4-H'ers. The sport of agility provides a basis for other activities such as search and rescue. Agility is exciting for both exhibitors and spectators, as well as motivating for the dogs.

WHEAT VARIETY PLOT DISPLAYS

The free-standing displays must not exceed the overall dimensions of 36" wide x 36" high x 18" deep (measured on the outside). Care should be taken to select durable materials that will withstand State Fair conditions. Displays must not require the use of

electricity. If booth exceeds overall dimensions, ribbon placing will be dropped one place.

- 1. These displays will have been planned and prepared by 4-H members enrolled in the wheat variety plot project.
- 2. Members must include the varieties provided in the display, but may include more varieties, if desired.

Basis for Awards:

1. Educational Value 70 %

Is the main idea of the display specific? Was the title or theme emphasized? Is the idea presented so clearly, so simply, so forcefully, that it will stop the casual observer? If the passerby stopped, did the display give the observer additional facts in a clear, concise way? For example, varietals differences in wheat, economic gains from adoption of desirable practices, etc.

2. Quality of Display Material 30%

Size, style and neatness of lettering, proportion of models and lettering balanced, workmanship, including handouts, if used, charts, models and lettering used effectively to teach ideas, colorful, artistic, neat and well balanced.

INTERIOR DESIGN & ARCHITECTURE **State Fair updated rules 2025**

This project is currently in its pilot year (2025) and most exhibit categories are new.

Special Rules for Interior Design & Architecture:

- 1. Judging for Interior Design & Architecture will be "conference judging" style. This will give each exhibitor the opportunity to discuss with the judge new techniques and elements of design used. The judge will then give an expert evaluation of the exhibitor's efforts in order to enhance the learning experience.
- 2. An entry card must be attached to the exhibit with material appropriate to the exhibit: safety pins, tape, string, etc.
- 3. Projects must follow individual class guidelines and provide enough information to explain design intent using basic design vocabulary as described in pilot project materials. A member may make only one exhibit in this division.
- 4. Projects entered that do not follow specific class guidelines will not be judged.
- 5. Quota A member may enter only one class in this division.

INTERIOR DESIGN FOCUS:

Interior Designers have the capacity to influence the way we feel when we inhabit a space. In some instances, this impact can be felt emotionally and physically, in other words, it can affect our mood. Tools such as color, light, texture and pattern can all be used to convey or stimulate such a response to a space.

Class 3045

Interior Room Presentation Board. Select one room within your home or imaginary/future home (bedroom, bathroom, kitchen, etc.) to design. Create a basic floor plan showing wall footprint including any furniture, fixture and/or cabinet layout. Include any other illustrations, drawings or photographs to help support your design. Also include material/finish samples (wall treatments, floor covering, paint samples, etc.) Label drawings, material finishes and any additional information so the audience understands their intention. All finishes should be attached to the presentation board along with budget information and design intent. To explain your design intent, write a brief description to be included on the design board. (no more than one page 8.5" x 11"). Presentation boards must be en foam core or a standard tri-fold display. Presentation board should be cut to size to fit all drawings, finish materials, images and written material so it's easily viewed without being oversized. Workmanship, design layout and neatness should be taken into consideration when completing the presentation board.

Class 3046

Two Collages on Presentation Board. In this project, develop two imaginary interior rooms. Each room should start with identical dimensions and features (doors, windows, etc.) The function of the room can be up to you (bedroom, coffee shop, art studio, etc.) but should be the same for both rooms. For each room, use collage to create a feeling or mood for the occupants of the space. The mood created for one space should be the opposite or contrast to the second space. Choose a pair of contrasting words from the list provided in the pilot project to get started. Pilot project materials are located on the Kansas 4-H website under "projects" and "Interior Design & Architecture". Each collage must be on its own page. Maximum page size is 11" x 17"; can use smaller dimensions if needed. Collages should utilize layers to convey a space that includes a background, midground and foreground. Once these are established, add as many additional layers as needed. Use print materials from magazines, colored or scrapbook paper, the internet, or other design materials to find furniture, lighting fixtures, textures and other elements to complete each collage. Don't worry too much about the functionality of the space, but focus on materials and colors to create the mood of the space. For each collage, write a brief description of your design intent. (one to three paragraphs total). Additionally, you may include research, inspiration imagery or any additional drawings that helped you design your space. Adhere both collages and design intent on a foamcore presentation board. Label each collage with the descriptive words you selected from the list. Foamcore presentation board should be cut to size to fit all collages, images and written material so it's easily viewed without being oversized. Workmanship, design layout and neatness, and design strategy should be taken into consideration when completing your presentation board.

Class 3047

Two Diorama Models. Similar to class 4401, 4-H Members will construct two dioramas, one for each space

demonstrating contrasting moods. Each diorama will be designed within similar sized boxes. Boxes should be large enough to be easily viewed but no larger than 12" length x 10" height x 8" depth. Both rooms being depicted need to be the same size. Manipulation to the box is allowed (cutting openings such as windows, etc.). Dioramas should utilize layers to convey a space which includes a background, midground and foreground. Use print materials from magazines, scrapbook paper, colored paper, the internet or other design materials to find items such as floor, ceiling or wall coverings, furniture, lighting fixtures, textures and other elements to complete each room or diorama. Elements will need to be cut out and adhered to a rigid material such as foamcore board or cardboard and securely placed inside the box to establish each background, midground and foreground to reflect the design of the room. Don't worry too much about the function of the space, focus on materials and colors to create the mood of the space. Use openings in your container to experiment with the effect of light in your space. Dioramas should not contain purchased toy figures, miniature furniture/cabinets, or moveable parts, but may include securely adhered 3-dimensional elements of the project member's own making. Elements should be adhered to materials easily found at home. For example: magazine photos, cardstock, plastic, cardboard, chipboard or other material to depict design finishes/elements within the diorama. Include a small, foamcore presentation board with the set of dioramas that includes design intent for each diorama and any research or inspiration imagery used to complete the dioramas. Workmanship, design layout and neatness, and design strategy should be taken into consideration when completing your dioramas.

ARCHITECTURE FOCUS:

Architects plan, design and oversee the construction of buildings and other structures beginning with concept development to the final construction phase of projects. It's also important that they ensure the final product is safe and functional. Architects balance artistic creativity with sound building techniques while also considering how the built environment impacts people's emotions and lifestyle.

Class 3048

Marble Maze or Enclosure. Create a space in which a marble will move through a sequence of rooms, enclosures or spaces. Use different types of elements and materials to enclose your spaces or guide the marble. Consider the size of the marble and how you want the space to feel - big and open or small and enclosed. Pay close attention to the sizes of architectural elements relative to the size of the marble. To begin, identify a clear goal for the marble maze or enclosure. Use the glossary in the pilot project materials (located at www.Kansas4H.org under projects, then Interior Design & Architecture) for design vocabulary to help support the goal. To construct the marble maze or enclosure, use household materials found around the home to create the structure. (cardboard, chipboard, construction paper, paper towel or toilet paper tubes, etc.) Materials don't have to be boring, but they should be functional. Don't be afraid to get creative with your construction materials when thinking of your overall goal and presentation. No minimum size requirements for this project, but the base of the structure should be no larger than 18" x 24" and 12" in height. In addition to your enclosure/maze, you may also present a small presentation board with illustrations/drawings to help the audience understand the path of travel for the marble, or the rules for which you designed. Presentation board can be made from foamcore or a small tri-fold display. Adhere illustrations, photos or drawings to the board with any other information useful to the viewer including design intent and goals you set for the marble maze/enclosure. Write or type a brief description of your design intent (1-3 paragraphs total) to be included on the presentation board. Workmanship, design layout and neatness, and design strategy should be taken into consideration when completing your enclosure.

Marble Maze Presentation Board Only. Design board should be foamcore or tri-fold display with below items

Include drawings of your marble enclosure/maze design; (examples include floor plan, section, elevations, etc.) In addition to your base drawings, include any illustrations/drawings to help your audience understand the path of travel for the marble. You should also include quality photographs that show the sequence of the marble moving through the built design. Images may be annotated, meaning you can use notes to explain your thoughts/design intent, on the board. This sequence of photos should visually tell the story of your design. Write or type a brief description of your design intent (1-3 paragraphs in total) to be included on the presentation board. Workmanship, design layout and neatness, and design strategy should be taken into consideration when completing your design board.

FOODS & NUTRITION

Special Rules for Foods & Nutrition:

- 1. An exhibitor will be enrolled according to 4-H age.
- 2. For cookies, muffins, biscuits, cinnamon rolls etc., the exhibitormust have 4 uniform examples. Favorite snack mixes,

popcorn snacks, etc, should consist of 1 cup. Cakes, breads, pies, etc., must be displayed whole.

- 3. Exhibits must be out of pans and displayed on cardboard, plastic or paper plates during judging. Muffins may be exhibited in or out of papers. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with crust showing, except for those cakes made with special designs such as bundt cakes. They should have crust side down. Each exhibit must be accompanied by the recipe. Following judging, items must be placed in a food storage container, plastic bag or cake carrier.
- 4. All food exhibits must be made from scratch. Frostingmay be from scratch or store bought, however the judge must be told.
- 5. Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Champion and Reserve Champion will be chosen in Foods and Food Baskets. A Grand and Reserve Champion will be chosen for decoratedcakes and a Grand and Reserve Champion will be given forfood preservation.
- 6. Items with * denotes that there is not a State Fair class.
- 7. For food classes, perishable foods (those with custardand cream cheese type fillings and frostings) and those requiring refrigeration will not be allowed. Two crust fruitpies and pecan pies are acceptable. For further guidance, please refer to the KSRE publication MF3544 Food Safety of Frostings and Fillings.
- 8. Each 4-H'er is limited to 2 total food entries, not including displays, baskets, canned items or booths.
- 9. Recipes that include cake mixes are not allowed.
- 10. Recipes that include alcohol are not allowed.
- 11. Recipe Box Entry Guidelines:

Notebook or recipe file which should include recipes usedfor 4-H foods projects (other recipes may be included).

Guidelines: division of food categories in alphabetical order; directions easy to read; minimum of twelve recipes. Must include six new recipes added for each year recipe collection is entered.

12. Ensure you pre-enter for decorated cakes and inform the judge of the class. You may use box mix for your cake; but it must be an editable cake. The judge should not cut into or try the cake. Decorated cakes are judged on appearance, neatness, creativity, and use of frosting and tips.

Food Auction Rules:

- 1. The Food Auction & Sale will take place directlyfollowing the Public Style Revue.
- 2. Food exhibits will be auctioned in the following order: Senior Grand Champion, Intermediate Grand Champion, Junior Grand Champion, then all remaining items in ribbonorder (Purple, Blue, Red & White).
- 3. All food will be auctioned on a price per item basis.
- 4. All Food project members are required to sell one itemat the auction. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to indicate to the superintendents which item will be sold. If he/she enters more than one food item, member must choose one. It does not need to be the highest ribbon placing.
- 5. If cookies, bar cookies, muffins, fruit leather, or other classes where only 4 items are stated, 4-H'ers must provide one dozen of that baked food item for food auction (12 cookies, 12 bar cookies, etc.) For snacks, cereal crunch, etc., 4-H'er must provide one-quart size container to be auctioned.
- 6. The 4-H member will receive the total sale price of thedesignated food auction item.
- 7. It is the 4-H'ers responsibility to get food items to thebuyer during or following the auction.
- 8. Food Baskets will not be auctioned.
- 9. Dress attire for sale: Jeans and shorts in good repair. Blouses & shirts only. **No** crop tops, tank tops, halter tops,T-shirts or hats.

Special Rules for Duct Tape:

- 5. No vulgar or suggestive decorations will be allowed.
- 6. Entries must be made of 90% duct tape. No sharpobjects allowed.

WOODWORKING

Special Rules for Woodworking:

- 1. THE PLAN FROM WHICH IT WAS CONSTRUCTED MUST BE ATTACHED TO THE ARTICLE EXHIBITED. The plan may be a photocopy, the actual pattern, or a scale drawing. It must be complete and accurate to the extent that a duplicate article could be built using the plan as a guide. Please note: a set of step by step instructions is not a plan. A cost of materials should be included.
- 2. Any project with missing or insufficient plans will be lowered one ribbon placing. (i.e. a blue-ribbon exhibit will receive a red ribbon).
- 3. The use of materials other than wood should be kept to a minimum.
- 4. In judging woodwork articles, consideration will be given to: Usefulness; Workmanship (Including accuracy to plan); Suitability; Design; Choice of Wood, and Quality of Finish.
- 5. Refinished/repaired furniture should be exhibited in Home Environment Single exhibit
- 6. Projects made from pre-cut kits are not allowed.
- 7. Firearms and weapons are not to be entered or exhibited.
- 8. A Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded in each age division.

Eligibility:

Each exhibitor is limited to one exhibit in this division.

Class 6001 Junior Division – 7-9 years old

Class 6002 Intermediate Division – 10-13 years old Class 6003 Senior Division – 14-18 years old

GEOLOGY

Special Rules for Geology:

- 1. The exhibit box should be 18" X 24" X $3\frac{1}{2}$ ". Plexiglass covers are required. Boxes with glass covers WILL NOT be accepted. All specimens are to be arranged across the narrow (18") dimension of the exhibit box, making the exhibit 18" across the top and 24" deep exactly. If a box has a sliding Plexiglas cover, it must be removable from the top. Screws, locks, or other devices that would prevent judges from removing the cover should not be used. For Lapidary classes 5300-5304 only, the dimensions of the box should be appropriate for the display, but should not exceed 18" X 24" X $3\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 2. Each exhibitor is required to identify each display box by placing an identification label bearing name, county and number of specimens in the upper left-hand corner of the Plexiglas cover using clear double-sided tape to adhere gummed labels and by attaching a label with the same info on the lower right-corner of the box (outside).
- 3. Exhibitor may enter in both geology and lapidary classes. Exhibitor may show in only one of the first four geology classes. Exhibitor may also show in Geology class special exhibit, Mineralogy, Fossils, and in one lapidary class.
- 4. Geology specimens should be labeled with the number of the specimens, date collected, specimen name or description and county where collected.
- 5. For geology classes, all specimens must be mounted in the box by proper groups: rocks, minerals, fossils. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum, Class and Genus level. Genus name is to begin with a capital letter. Species name is all lower case. Genus and species names must either be italicized or underlined, not both. The words "phylum, class, genus" on labels are to be spelled out, not abbreviated. More than one specimen of the same kind of rock or mineral or species of a fossil may be exhibited if this duplication represents different geological formations. Specimen label must show this distinction (Fort Hays Limestone, note just limestone; calcite from the Greenhorn Formation, not just calcite; Phylum: Brachiopoda Class: Articulata Genus: Composita from the Morrill Limestone Member, not just phylum: Barchiopoda Class:

Articulata Genus: Composita

6. For geology classes, all specimens must be collected by the participant (not purchased) from locations in Kansas, with the exception of Tri-State Mining Area specimens collected from these three adjacent counties: Ottawa County, OK; Newton and Jasper Counties, MO. Out-of-state specimens will not count in the minimum number of the class and will not be considered in the judging.

- Class 7001 Display at least 15 different rocks, mineralsor fossils. Limited to one exhibit box. Fossils must be identified to the Phylum level. This class open to only those exhibiting at the Logan County Fair for thefirst time.
- Class 7002 Display at least 30 different rocks, minerals, or fossils. Must be at least 5 of each. 15 must be collected during the current 4-H year. Limited to one exhibit box. This class open to those exhibiting first or second year at the Logan County Fair.
- Class 7003 Display at least 45 rocks, minerals or fossils. Must be at least 5 of each.15 must be collected during the current 4-H year. Exhibit limited to two boxes. This class is open to those exhibiting either the third or fourth year at the Logan County Fair. Identify the rocks as igneous, metamorphic or sedimentary. These rock types must be spelled out on labels or have a legible key.
- Class 7004 Display at least 60 rocks, minerals, or fossils, at least 5 of each. 15 must be collected during the current 4-H year. Exhibit limited to two This class is open to those exhibiting the fifth time or more at the Logan County Fair. Identify the rocks as igneous, metamorphic or sedimentary. These rock types must be spelled on labels or have a legible key.
- Class 7005 Special exhibit relating geology to everyday living, or to mineral test, a rock formation, geological history, or species of fossil. Forms of one mineral, variation of one kind of rock, archeological artifacts or Indian artifacts. Digital format are accepted. Please make arrangements for the judge to view your exhibit and have a hard copy for display. Exhibit limited to 4 ft. of table Care should be taken to use durable materials that with withsatend County Fair conditions. Exhibitor may show in the class regardless of number of times he or she has exhibite at the Logan County Fair, or whether exhibitor has enteries in classes 7001, 7002, 7003, or 7004. Exhibitor may also exhbit in lapidary class.
- Class 7006 Mineralogy. Display a minimum of 15 mineral specimens collected in Kansas, at least 5 of which habve been colleted during the current 4-H year. The minerals are to be grouped by minder class (Carbonates, Oxides, Silicates) and at least 3 classes must be represented. The member must use one standard display box. The specimens must be labeled with the nuber of specimen, date collected, name of specimen, county where collected and chemical composition (CaCO3 for calcite) if known.
- Class 7007

 Fossils. Display a minimum of 15 Fossil specimens collected by the participant in Kansas, at least 5 of which have been collected during the current 4-H year. The fossils are to be grouped by Phylum and Class, and at least 3 phyla must be represented (Brachiopoda, Chordata, Mollusca, Etc.) The member must use one standard display box. The specimens must be labeled with the number of the specimen, date collected, county where collected, formation, member, or source; phylum, class, and genus or part; and geologic age (cretaceous, Permian, Pennsylvanian, ect.)
- Class 7008 Rocks. Display a minimum of 15 rock specimens collected in Kansas, at least 5 of which have been collected during the current 4-H year. Rocks areto be grouped by the 3 rock classes (sedimentary, Igneous, and Metamorphic). You must display at least 1 specimen from each of the three classes. The specimens must fit in one standard display box. Specimen labels must include a specimen number, the date collected, name of specimen, and the county where collected. All rocks must be identified by the formation and member name. (Example: Fort Hays Limestone, Member of the Niobrara Chalk Formation) or source (Example: Rocky Mountain Outwash, Glacial Till).

Introduction to Lapidary Classes:

- 1. All Lapidary specimens should be labeled with the following information: specimen name, place of origin (country, state, or county; county required for Kansas specimens), purchased or self-collected, date lapidary treatment began, date lapidary treatment complete (treatment completed after the Fair is considered a new year specimen.)
- Class 7009 Exhibit at least 5 varieties of polished (tumbled) specimens and 5 varieties of unpolished specimens that have not yet received lapidary. These do not have to be an example of "before and after", nor do they have to be self-collected. Locales must be identified.
- Class 7010 Display before and after examples of at least 3 varieties of specimens, at least 2 tumble-polished and 2 unpolished of each. There is no requirement that the 4-H'er collect any of these. Locales must be identified. Lapidary work should be done during the current 4-H year.
- Class 7011 Display before and after examples of at least 6 varieties of specimens, at least 2 tumble-polished and 2 unpolished each. At least 2 varieties should be collected from the native site by the 4-H'er, at least one of which comes from Kansas. Locales must be identified. Lapidary work on at least 3 varieties should be done during the current 4-H year.
- Class 7012 Display before and after example of at least 9 varieties of specimens, at least 2 tumble-polished and 2 unpolished each. At least 3 varieties should be collected from the native site by the 4-H'er, at least two of

which comes from Kansas. Locales must be identified. Lapidary work on at least 3 varieties should be done during the current 4-H year.

Class 7013

Exhibit at least 6 specimens that have not previously been exhibited, which have received lapidary treatment. Lapidary treatment may consist of polishing, and end, face, or flat lapping. Specimens must represent at least 3 different varieties and include at least 3 cabochons of any size or shape, only one of which may be free-formed. A cabochon is a style of cutting in which the top of the stone forms a domed or curved convex surface. Three of the specimens must be mounted into jewelry findings

ENTOMOLOGY

Special Rules for Entomology:

- 1. A 4-H member may choose to exhibit in the collectionand education class for each phase or both.
- 2. Individual entries are to be placed in standard Plexiglascovered boxes, 18"x24"x3½". No glass tops allowed.
- 3. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box by placing an identification label bearing exhibitor's name, county and class. One label goes in the upper left corner of the box (inside) and the other in the lower right corner of the box (outside). Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.
- 4. The number of orders, specimens and families requiredmust be included on the exhibitor's box identification label.
- 5. Emphasis in judging will be placed on the overall variety of Kansas insects represented in the collection, accuracy of identification, skill and technique acquired in mounting of specimens and overall arrangement and appearance of the collection.
- 6. For each collection class, two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First is the common namelabel and the second label is a date/locality label.
- 7. Exhibition of the current year's collection is encouraged. However, each specimen should have a value in itself. The "rare find" shown in the beginning phase should have a place in the more advanced phases.
- 8. Purpose of the project is to encourage identification of our Kansas insects. If there are "exotics" in the collection, they should be in a separate area given for exotic specimens, except as they may enhance the overall appearance of the collection.
- 9. Educational Classes Educational displays are to be exhibited in one standard size insect box and identified byan identification label as discussed above. It is to include the exhibitor's name, county and class. Information on numbers and kinds of insects is not needed for educational exhibits.
- *Displays may consist of specialized groups of insects, orrelate to any aspect of insect life. Displays should be presented in a clear, concise, and interesting manner.
- a. Educational classes are limited to one standard box, amaximum of 150 specimens, and be work performed during the current year.
- b. Title of the exhibit should be inside the box.
- c. Purpose of the project is to learn more about the importance, life cycles, biology, ecology, diversity, etc. of insects and related arthropods. Subject matter can be asvaried as the animals themselves.

Introduction to Entomology

Class 8001

Display of 15 minimum and maximum of 30 specimens representing at least 6 orders in a small box (school or cigar) with a piece of plastic wrap or Plexiglas taped across the top of the box. *This class is noteligible for State Fair.*

Beginning Entomology I

Class 8002

Collection - Display in one standard box, aminimum of 50 and a maximum of 125 species, representing at least 7 orders.

Specimens should be grouped according to order. Order labels should be pinned to the base of the box. Two labels are required on each specimen. First label directly beneath the insect, centered on the pin, is the common name label.

Common name refers to the commonly accepted name for the insect. Example ofcommon names include grasshoppers, cockroaches, or walking sticks for insects that belong to the order Orthoptera. Whenin doubt, use the common name designated for the group in question. The second label is a date/locality label. It will be centered on the pin beneath the common label. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon in the Beginning I phase at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first. Members would generally be encouraged to move on into Beginning II after one good year in the Beginning I phase.

Class 8003 Beginning Entomology/Educational Exhibit, a minimum of 15 insects.

Class 8004 Collection - Display in one standard box aminimum of 75 and a maximum of 150 insects representing at

least 9 orders. All specimens should be grouped to order.

Two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. The first is the common name label and the second is a date/locality label. Members can exhibit inthis class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive

a purple ribbon in the Beginning II class at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first.

Class 8006

Collection - Display a minimum of 100 and a maximum of 300 insects representing atleast 10 orders. Two standard boxes can be used. All specimens should be

grouped to order. All insects in the orders of Orthoptera, Hemiptera, Homoptera, Coleoptera, Diptera and Hymenoptera are to be identified to family. The number of families in these orders must be recorded on the box identification label. Families represent subdivisions of order groupings, and family labels will be pinned to the bottom of the box to represent subdivisions of the appropriate order. Members can exhibit in this class a maximum of 3 years, or until they receive a purple ribbon in the Intermediate class at the Kansas State Fair, whichever comes first.

Class 8007 Intermediate Educational Exhibit

Advanced Entomology

Class 8008

Collection - Display a minimum of 150 and a maximum of 450 insects representing at least 12 orders. Three standard boxes canbe used. Family identification is required for all insects belonging to the six basic orders as outlined under the Intermediate phase. Family identification of insects in the remaining orders is optional, but desirable as long as accuracy is maintained. Two labels are required for each specimen - first the common name label followed by the date/locality label, both of which are centered on the pin beneath the insect. The guidelines detailed under the intermediate phase mayalso be used in the advanced phase except that all butterflies appearing in the collection should be labeled with the correct common name. Members may continue to exhibit in this class as long as they remain eligible for 4-H membership.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Special Rules for Photography:

- 1. Conference Judging for Photography will be held at the Western Vista Building. A schedule for judging will be sent to 4-H'ers enrolled in the photography project.
- 2. Black & white or color photographs may be exhibited.
- 3. All photos must be no larger than 8"x10" and no smallerthan 7"x 9", except story pictures which may be 3"x5". Story picture exhibits are not eligible for the Kansas State Fair at the 3"x5" size.
- 4. Photos are to be mounted across the 11" dimension of a11"x12.5" studio mount. The top edge of the print must be 1" below the top of the mount. Side of the print must be equal distance from the two sides of the mount. A permanent mount must be made using photographic dry mount tissue or equivalent. Remove white border from the enlargement before mounting. Mount pictures on the whiteside of mat. Mounting boards may be purchased from the Extension Office. Story pictures may be mounted on a 12"x20" poster board.
- 5. Photos should be submitted in a standard photo bag fortheir protection.
- 6. No letters will be permitted on the mount, or on the picture. No underlays or borders are to be used. Each exhibitor's name and photo class should be written on the back in the lower left-hand corner in pencil.
- 7. Photographs exhibited must be the result of the currentyear's project work by the 4-H members.
- 8. Ribbons for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded for each exhibitor experience division, notage division.
- 9. Photos with live subject(s) on railroad right of way or taken from railroad right of way property will not be displayed in the Logan County Fair and will be disqualified and not judged.
 - A. Posing on or taking photos from railroad tracksis a practice that is both dangerous and illegal. If you trespass while photographing, you can receive citation, fine, jail time, or more severe consequences such as injury or death. Trains do not stop quickly and you may not see or hear one coming until it is too late.
- *Suggestion: Have digital prints printed professionally by a lab or service. Home photo printers do not judge competitively against professional printing.

Class 9001 Color photos taken by a 4-H member with 3 years or less in the project.

Class 9002 Color photos taken by a 4-H member with 4-7 years in the project.

Class 9003 Color photos taken by a 4-H member with8 or more years in the project.

Class 9004 Black and white photos-all levels of

experience.

Class 9005 Computer manipulated photos;


manipulated does not include normal cropping, enlargement, or color intensity treatment but are

manipulated in the computer beyond that which can be done in a darkroom. Photo must be an original taken

by the exhibitor. Exhibitor must provide a small (4" x "6 or smaller) original photo.

Class 9006 Photos with special effects. (Darkroom manipulation of print and/or in-camera manipulation of the

negative)



Class 9007 Videos/movies (DVD or USB drive format)

Special rules for Videos/Movies:

- 1. Will be judged in a projected format.
- 2. Criteria for judging shall include: (1) Evidence on the story line; (2) Use of camera angles; (3) Use of zooming techniques; and (4) Smoothness of scene changes
- 3. No time or date should be imprinted on the tape.
- 4. All of the rules of photographic techniques, such as therule of thirds, composition, framing, etc., will be applied.
- 5. Videos or movies shall be from three to five minutes inlength.
- 6. Sound should follow the story line and should be morethan dialog, but sound is not required.
- 7. Titles may be used but are not required.
- 8. Videos must be on a standard DVD disk or USB flashdrive.
- 9. Place media and entry card into a quart size self-sealingplastic bag.

ELECTRIC & RENEWABLE ENERGY

Special Rules for Electric & Renewable Energy:

- 1. Articles should be cleaned before exhibiting if it has been used.
- 2. A sheet of operation instructions should be furnished for any exhibit not self-explanatory.
- 3. Projects (classes 4600, 4601 and 4602) must be operable using only 110 or 120V AC or battery power. If battery power is required, batteries must be furnished.
- 4. Any project with a complexity of size or electronics must have (a) instructions for assembly and use and (b) equipment available at the time of judging for actual testing of the exhibit. All entries must be items made in a 4-H electric project.
- 5. No hand dipped solder may be used on exhibits

ELECTRICAL AND ELECTRONICS

Class 10001

AC Electric: Electric projects with a 110 or 120 V alternating current (AC) power source. Some project examples are household wiring demonstrations, small appliances extension cords, trouble lights, indoor or outdoor wiring boards, or shop lights. Projects may be a restoration or original construction. The project must be operational and meet minimum safety standards. AC projects must be 110/120 V, no 240 V exhibits are allowed, and must be constructed such that the judges have wiring access to examine the quality and safety of workmanship.

Class 10002 DC Electric: Electric projects with a battery or direct current power source. This class includes electric kits or original projects. This class also includes demonstration DC powered project. Examples include: wiring two- or three-way switches, difference between series/parallel lighting circuits or wiring doorbells switches. All DC electric projects must include batteries supplied by 4-H'er. Projects must be constructed such that the judges have access to examine the quality of wiring workmanship.

Class 10003 Electronic: Electronic projects with a battery or direct current power source. This class includes electronic kits or original projects. Examples include radios, telephones, toy robots, light meters, security systems, etc. May be constructed using printed circuit board, wire wrap, or breadboard techniques. Include instruction/assembly manual if from a kit. Include plans if an original project. Projects must be constructed such that the judges have access to examine the quality of wiring workmanship.

Class 10004 Educational Displays and Exhibits: The purpose of the educational display and exhibit is to educate the viewer about a specific area of the 4-H electrical or electronics project. The display or exhibit should illustrate one basic idea. This class includes any educational displays, exhibits or science fair type projects which DO NOT have a power source, i.e. exhibits, posters or displays of wire types, conduit types, electrical safety, tool or motor parts identification or electrical terminology. Educational displays and exhibits must be legible from a distance of four feet, using a maximum tri-fold size of 3' x 4'.

SMALL ENGINES

Special Rules for Small Engines

- 1. Displays are limited to 4 ft. wide and 4 ft. deep bothupright and floor displays.
- 2. Engines must be smaller than 20 horsepower.

Class 11001

Exhibit a display selecting one of the

following options: 1) a display identifying different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or a display showing the function of the various engine or lawn and garden equipment parts OR 2) a display identifying and explaining the functions for different special tools needed for small engine work OR 3) a display illustrating and providing the results of any one of experiments that are included in the project books. No complete engines, lawntractors, tillers, chainsaws are permitted fordisplay.

Maintenance

Class 11002

Exhibit a display that illustrates either 1)routine maintenance procedures <u>OR</u> 2) diagnosing and troubleshooting specific problems in an engine. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws are permitted for display

Operation

Class 11003

Exhibit an operable small engine overhauled or rebuilt by the member. Include maintenance schedule for the engine and a brief description of steps taken by the member overhauling or rebuilding the engine.

AEROSPACE/ROCKETRY

Special Rules for Aerospace/Rocketry:

Rocketry

- 1. 4-H'er must be currently enrolled in the 4-H rocketryprogram.
- 2. Grand Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded from the purple placings in the construction only.
- 3. Rockets must be constructed during the current year. Each rocket must have been flown. Each rocket exhibitedmust be able to stand freely by itself or be supported on a wooden base, not to exceed 3/4" x 8" square for small and medium sized rockets; wooden or metal support rods must not extend past the tip of the nose cone. Do not submit onlaunch pad.
- 4. Plans (or a copy of it) must accompany the rocket.
- 5. For original design rockets, describe in summary howmodel was tested for stability prior to flying.
- 6. Angles of the fins must fall with a plus or minus 2 $^{\circ}$

variation.

- 7. Exhibits must be uniformly painted, smoothly finished, have decals applied smoothly, and be properly assembledand painted according to accompanying plans.
- 8. Beginner kits with prefabricated plastic in assemblies and pre finished rockets requiring no painting are not acceptable.
- 9. Engines and ignitors are not permitted with exhibits.
- 10. Exhibitors who exhibit a rocket using a size E engine or larger will be required to provide National Association of Rocketry (NAR) membership number on the exhibit entry card.
- **There will be no Grand Champion or Reserve Champion awarded for this.

ROCKETRY

1.Each exhibitor may enter one robot per class. **The Exhibit must have been constructed/completed duringthe current 4-H year.**

Each robot must be free-standing without the need foradditional supports in order to be moved or exhibited.

2.Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2 feet wide, by 2 feet deep. Weight may not exceed 15 pounds.

3.All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is **NOT** considered an adequate

Class 12001 Introductory rocket -1st yr members only

Class 12002 Rocket made from kit

Class 12003 Rocket designed by exhibitor, not merelymodification of an existing kit rocket

Class 12004 Launch of rocket

ROBOTICS

- 1. Each exhibitor may enter one robot per class. The Exhibit must have been constructed/completed duringthe current 4-H year.
- 2. Each robot must be free-standing without the need foradditional supports in order to be moved or exhibited. Robot dimensions should not exceed 2 feet high, by 2feet wide, by 2 feet deep. Weight may not exceed 15 pounds.
- 3. All electric components of the robot must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is **NOT** considered an adequate enclosure or covering for electrical components.
- 4. Robots must be powered by an electrical, battery, water, or solar source only. Robots powered by fossil fuelsor flammable liquids will be disqualified. All robots must include an on/off switch for operation. No remote control devices will be allowed.
- 5. Each robot must be in working condition. The judges will operate each robot to evaluate its workmanship and its ability to complete the required tasks for the current 4-H year.
- 6. The exhibit must include written instructions for operation, construction plans and one to three pages of project photographs. This information should be placedinside a 10X13 inch manila envelope.
- 7. Educational displays are limited to one 2x3 foot tri-folddisplay board and no more than 3x3 foot of table space. No card board table exhibits will be allowed. No electricity will be provided.

COMPUTER SCIENCE **NEW ADDITION 2025**

Special Rules for Computer Science:

- 1. Any item which IS NOT a notebook, display board, or poster displayed in this class is considered a "computer system" exhibit and MUST follow the rules set forth below.
- 2. The actual construction of computer hardware (i.e., building a computer, electronic devices with a motherboard-based manipulation) will remain in the Energy Management division.
- 3. 4-H members must be currently enrolled in the 4-H Computer Science project to exhibit in this division.
- 4. Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class. Exhibits must have been completed during the current 4-H year and have been selected at the county level for entry at the State Fair. Counties or districts should select only top blue or purple ribbon computer exhibits which meet State Fair guidelines.
- 5. Exhibitor's name, county or district, 4-H age, and years(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the exhibit, educational display, notebook, and/or poster.
- 6. See the last section for full details about exhibiting posters, display boards and notebooks.
- 7. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judges' discretion,

will receive a participation ribbon.

- 8. All exhibits must be:
 - a. Self-contained on a USB drive (thumb drive, flash drive, jump drive, or other any other name for a small USB storage device; the rules will use "USB drive"). This means that a judge can plug in the USB drive into a computer and run the exhibit as described below.
- b. OR System -On-A-Chip (SOC) (such as Raspberry Pi) or a MicroController (such as an Arduino or Ozobot) AND is a compact (less than 8"X 8"X 8") system, which can be programmed AND requires minimal assembly to operate (e.g. connecting power, display, and keyboard/mouse cables). Referred to as a "chip system" through the rest of the rules.

 9. Physical computers such as tablets, smart phones, laptops, or personal computers (PCs) will not be accepted as an exhibit.
- 10. "Chip systems" may use/include GPIO bread boards or HATs (Hardware Attached on Top) the size of which is not included in the size of the chip system however the total size of the chip system and GPIO devices may not exceed 24"X24"X24" including any protective enclosures.
- 11. Any attached GPIO devices are not judged for electrical construction or quality as this division is focused on the operational aspects of the system (the code). Some of these systems, with automation, can also be classified as a Robot, and the exhibitor must decide which division to exhibit in as the exhibit may not be entered in both divisions.
- 12. For chip systems, all electric components of the system must be adequately covered or concealed with a protective enclosure. Paper is NOT considered an adequate enclosure or covering for the electrical components.
- 13. All revisions of all forms previously released for the STEM division either undated or dated prior to current year are void for use and new forms must be obtained and used that are dated by the Kansas State 4-H Office for the current year. Use of old forms should result in the loss of one ribbon placing for exhibits.
- 14. For all computer system entries, the following items are required as part of an exhibit packet:
 - a. A manila envelope with the Computer Exhibit Form, which is available through your local K-State Research and Extension office or at http://computers.engtech4ks.com/. This form must be attached to the outside of a 10" x 13" manila envelope. Do not tie the envelope to the exhibit.
- b. A USB drive labeled with the 4-Hers name, county/district, and club; in a way that does not prevent it from being plugged into a computer.
 - c. For exhibits that are entered only on USB drives,. one graphic should be uploaded to emailed to pmaddy@ksu.edu with the exhibitor number and exhibit number by August 23rd. It should show the completed project (such as a screen shot/capture, slide, or similar). This image will be part of a digital display at the State Fair. The only thing to be picked up at the end of the state fair will be the exhibit card. The rest of the exhibit materials will be returned to the county/district offices in their "county packs." For county fairs it is recommended to display the manila envelope.
- d. Instructions to run any part of the exhibit on the USB drive. (There should be at least two (2) items in your manila envelope: USB drive and instructions).
- 15. Each exhibit must be accompanied by a "4-H Engineer's Journal." The engineer's journal should be typed. It can either be included electronically on the USB drive (preferred) or printed and placed in the manila envelope.
 - a. The "4-H Engineer's Journal" should start with a dated entry describing what the 4-H member is trying to accomplish/build.
- b. The "4-H Engineer's Journal" should conclude with a dated entry describing what the 4-H member achieved in creating. (The start and end many times will be different. The judges are interested in the journey).
- c. Additional entries in the "4-H Engineer's Journal" should be made as progress occur describing successes and failures; as well as the steps done and any sources of information including links used.
 - d. Pictures can also be included in the "4-H Engineer's Journal" but should not be more than 50% of the entries.
 - e. The "4-H Engineer's Journal" should contain at least one graphic.
 - f. The "4-H Engineer's Journal" must be at least 3 pages in length.
 - g. An example of a "4-H Engineer's Journal" can be found at http://computers.engtech4ks.com/.
- h. The "4-H Engineer's Journal" will comprise 25% of the overall exhibit score. Failure to include a "4-H Engineer's Journal" will result in the exhibit being disqualified.
- 16. If the exhibit is a program, application, app, web site, or requires any coding, the source code must be included on the USB drive. Failure to include a copy of the "source code" may result in up to one ribbon place deduction.
- 17. Flow diagrams or decision trees showing the logical flow of code must be included on the USB drive for all coded exhibits. PowerPoints presentations, for example, would not require a decision tree or flow diagram.
- 18. Since there is no conference judging at the Kansas State Fair, a set of instructions must be provided to run the computer system /application. These instructions should be printed off and included in the exhibit package and a copy should be included on the USB drive.
- a. FOR COUNTY FAIRS it is recommended that 4-Hers bring a computer that will run their project to the fair for judging as judges typically do not bring computers with them. Operating instructions are still required.
 - b. Instructions should be written as though you were helping a less techy person, (like a grandparent) operate your exhibit, similar to what is described in rule 19 below. An example of instructions can be found at http://computers.engtech4ks.com/.

- 19. Each exhibit MUST include a video of the youth following their instructions for operation. For presentations, such as PowerPoint, this should include delivering the presentation. This allows judges to get a better understanding of the exhibit and allows the youth the opportunity to fully demonstrate their exhibit. The video should be no longer than 8 minutes and should be placed on the USB drive or, if desired, uploaded as to YouTube as an unlisted video and a link to that video included in a file titled "VideoLink." These videos may also be considered for inclusion in a running video loop in the STEM area at the state fair after review by judges, superintendent(s), and extension staff. Adult guardians must complete the video release included with the exhibit form. If the release is not completed the video will not be included in the video loop on display in the STEM area at the Kansas State Fair.
- a. FOR COUNTY FAIRS with consultation judging, it is recommended that the video elements be waived in favor of talking with the exhibitor.
- 20. Each exhibit must accomplish a specific automated task using a computer, a chip system, URL, or virtual machine (VM).
- 21. Kanas State Fair Judge(s) in the computer system division will have a physical computer with the following minimum configuration to test exhibits with and view files:
 - a. Microsoft Windows® 10 or Windows® 11
 - b. Microsoft Office® 365 (Excel, Power Point, & Word)
 - c. Microsoft Visual Studio®
 - d. Microsoft Edge Browser®
 - e. Mozilla Firefox® Browser
 - f. Google Chrome® Browser
 - g. Adobe Acrobat Reader®
 - h. Apache OpenOffice®
 - i. VMware Player Windows 64bit
 - j. Scratch Desktop editor (offline version)
- 22. The STEM judges will have internet access at the Kansas State Fair. Internet based content may be included in exhibits. Exhibitors should take great care and only go on-line with their guardian's permission. User names and passwords should not be included in exhibits. If they are required to view the content, a temporary user account and password should be created for judging at the Kansas State Fair, once judging is complete the user name and password should be disabled on the account. If a separate user account is not possible, the content should be included as part of the video. YOU SHOULD NOT SHARE YOUR USER NAME OR PASSWORD WITH OTHERS.
- 23. All licensing should be adhered to for any software used in the exhibit. Failure to do so will result in a reduction of one ribbon placing and may not be considered for best of show.
- 24. The creation of viruses, malware, malicious applications or code, defamatory language or graphics, bullying, or any material that is "mean," "dangerous," or harmful according to the judge's opinion will result in the exhibit being disqualified.
- 25. Pictures or still graphics created are not eligible for entry as a project in this division and should be entered in the appropriate photography division.
- 26. Judging will be based on a score sheet which can be found at http://computers.engtech4ks.com/. There are four (4) areas each exhibit will be judged on. They are:
 - a. 4-H Engineers Journal (what I learned to make it work), 25% overall score
 - b. Instructions (how I help others make it work), 25% overall score
 - c. Functionality (does it work), 25% overall score
 - d. Diagrams (and code if applicable) (how I think it works), 25% overall score
- 27. Computer exhibits may be checked out for use in a Kansas State Fair 4-H demonstration or 4-H illustrated talk with prior permission. For permission, check with the superintendent or the information desk in 4-H Centennial Hall. The exhibit must be returned to display immediately after the demonstration/illustrated talk, or the exhibit will be disqualified. Exhibitors and/or their designees may not remove exhibits from 4-H Centennial Hall prior to the exhibit release time on Sunday evening without the express consent of State 4-H staff, any exhibit removed before release time will be disqualified.

Eligibility – Each exhibitor may enter one exhibit per class.

Computer System Division

CLASS 5590 Computer program, application, app, script, or coded system that is new and unique (not merely a file run in a program, such as a 'word document' or a picture drawn in 'Microsoft Paint').

CLASS 5591 Computer presentation (power point, web page/site, animated graphics such as gifs, etc.)

CLASS 5592 Single computer system (web server, database server, etc.) represented as a virtual machine.

CLASS 5593 Networked system consisting of two or more virtual machines.

CLASS 5594 Chip system - a small (8"X8"X8") programmed physical device that accomplishes a specific task.

Educational Exhibits Rules

1. For notebooks, display boards, and posters, no additional exhibit information is Page | 48 required; no manila envelope is

needed for these exhibits.

- 2. Exhibits are to have a clear link to the Engineering and Technology areas of astronomy, computers, rocketry, robotics, or uncrewed aerial systems, educational exhibits outside of these Engineering and Technology areas should be displayed in the other program areas. Just because an educational exhibit relates to the broad concept of Engineering and Technology does not qualify it to be displayed in the Engineering and Technology Educational Exhibit area. Exhibits that do not clearly show a clear and direct relationship to the Engineering and Technology project areas of ag-mechanics, ABC, astronomy, computers, robotics, rocketry, or UAS as previously defined will be disqualified.
- 3. Exhibits in posters, notebooks and display boards must contain substantial supporting educational materials.
- 4. Educational display boards, posters and notebooks should be creative and showcase details about the knowledge learned in the project during the current 4-H year. Value is placed on youth who can demonstrate how their skills have increased while completing the project. Each exhibit will be judged on uniqueness, creativity, neatness, accuracy of material, knowledge gained, and content. An exhibit judging score sheet available at http://computers.engtech4ks.com/. For example, a rocket that may have crashed and/or is highly damaged may be made into an educational display or poster that tells a great story with many lessons learned.
- 5. Follow copyright laws, citing all sources of information in a standard notation Sources of information must be cited on the front of your exhibit, including all posters and educational display boards.
- 6. Educational displays are not to exceed a standard commercial 3' x 4' tri-fold display board. No card table exhibits will be allowed. Care should be taken to use durable materials that will withstand Kansas State Fair conditions.
- 7. "Construction Kits" that are part of Educational displays must be contained in cases (tackle boxes, sealable containers, etc.) that may not be larger than 1' x 2' x 2' and must have a latch which securely keeps all components contained in the "Construction Kits". Other components are to adhere to appropriate dimensions as stated elsewhere.
- 8. Educational Project notebooks must be organized in a 3-ring binder.
- 9. Any three-dimensional poster or display board exhibits may not be thicker than 2 inches.
- 10. Engines and igniters for rockets ARE NOT permitted with the exhibit and constitute an immediate disqualification. This is for safety reasons and includes both spent and live engines.
- 11. Exhibitor's name, Extension Unit, age, and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled in a prominent location on the notebook, and/or "Construction Kit." For education displays and/or posters the exhibitor's name, county, or district, age, and year(s) in project must be tagged or labeled on the back of the exhibit. Exhibit cards are not sufficient as they may be removed or repositioned for display. Failure to label an exhibit may result in one ribbon placing deduction.
- 12. Exhibits should possess the following qualities (in no particular order): a. A Central theme Page | 49 b. What you want others to learn c. Be designed and constructed in a manner befitting the exhibit d. Be something you are interested in e. Be related to Astronomy. Computer System, Robotics, Rocketry, or Uncrewed Aerial Systems
- 13. If a safety violation is noted by the judges, superintendent, or other staff, the exhibitor's exhibit, at the judge's discretion, will receive a participation ribbon.
- 14. Posters, Notebooks, and Display Boards may be checked out for use in a Kansas State Fair 4-H demonstration or illustrated talk with prior permission. For permission, check with the superintendent(s). The exhibit must be returned to display immediately after the demonstration/illustrated talk, or the exhibit will be disqualified.

Club Banners

Special Rules for Club Banners:

- 1. Banners must be made by 4-H members. No professional or commercial assistance or processing.
- 2. Banners are a two dimensional display depicting one idea. The theme guidelines are the same for the booths.
- 3. Banners should be made out of flame resistant material.
- 4. Dimensions are to be no less than 12 square feet and no more than 16 square feet, with a minimum of 3 feet on one side. Letters should be 2 inches in height.
- 5. Banners must be hung on a wooden dowel stick strongenough to support the banner.
- 6. On each end of the dowel rod, there must be a chain 6inches long with an "S" hook for display purposes. Banners mounted any other way will not be displayed.
- 7. Banners should be made of materials that permit the banner to be folded or rolled without damaging the display.
- 8. A label is to be attached to the back lower left hand corner of the banner giving the name of the club, county and year.

 Names of members are optional. Waterproof ink prevents smearing and is recommended for the label. Class 13006

WILDLIFE

Special Rules for Wildlife:

- 1. Types of exhibits in this division are open to educationalor creative displays, educational posters or notebooks.
- 2. 4-H exhibitors should avoid using copyrighted materialswhenever possible by originating his/her own work.Copyrighted and/or trademarked materials utilized in banners, displays, demonstrations, posters or other displays of endorsement or promotion instead of educational purposes will be disqualified and will not bedisplayed or receive ribbons or premiums.
- 3. Exhibitors must comply with State & Federal laws. It is illegal to possess threatened or endangered wildlife, or thefeathers,

nests or eggs of nongame birds. Game birds andgame animals taken legally during an open season may beused. The use of live wild animals in educational exhibits is prohibited.

- 4. Name, county, and year in project should be in aprominent location on the exhibit.
- 5. Care should be taken to select durable materials that will with stand.

Class 14001 Notebooks. Contents pertain to some

phase, results, story or information about the wildlife project.

Class 14002 Educational poster. Must be related to something learned in the wildlife project.

Class 14003 Educational display. Must be directly

related to the wildlife project.

FORESTRY

Special Rules for Forestry:

- 1. All leaf exhibits are to be mounted on 8½" x 11" heavy stock paper and placed in loose leaf binders. (Magnetic or adhesive filler sheets for photographic prints or sheet protectors are recommended.) Twigs and fruit collections may be exhibited in whatever manner you choose. Maximum tri fold size is 3' x 4'. Resources for exhibiting are located on the Kansas 4-H forestry project webpage.
- 2. Name, club, age, and year in project should be on front cover or in a prominent location.
- 3. Leaves should be identified with an appropriate label located near the leaf on the same page. These labels should include (1) The proper common name as listed in the 4H334, "List of Native Kansas Forest Trees" 2) Location (city and/or county) where collected; and (3) date (day, month, year) or (month, day, year) collected.
- 4. Divide specimens into the following two sections: Native Kansas Trees, and Non-Native Trees.
- 5. New specimens are those specimens collected during the current 4-H year and cannot be a duplicate tree species of previously displayed specimens.
- 6. Group specimens according to the years collected (ex. "old-previous years" and "new").
- 7. Variations of varieties do not count as different species or specimens.
- 8. When replacing previously displayed samples, due to degradation, improper mounting or incorrect identification, the specimen label must also be updated. Replacements do not count as new specimens. Replacements should be displayed in the "old previous" section of the display.
- 9. If you retrieve information for your forestry exhibit, you must include a reference citation to the source.
- 10. In all leaf collections, exhibit one complete leaf where possible. If leaf is too large, exhibit as much as possible. Sketch in reduced scale the entire leaf

and illustrate where the exhibited portion is from. Note: A "leaflet" is incorrect when displayed as the complete leaf for the tree.

11. All work must show originality. Leaf collections and displays should not closely resemble work done by others in the same club.

Quota – Each member may enter up to two exhibits in 4-H Forestry but only one entry per class. Participants can exhibit in a collection phase and one other class, 15004-15009, or they may exhibit in any two non-collection classes, 15004-15009.

Knowing Trees as Individuals – Leaf Collections

Class 15001 Forestry Collection: (Choose either A or B) Only those exhibiting at the state fair for the first year may enter this class. A. Exhibit a minimum of 10 different leaves from native Kansas trees collected within the year. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees. B. Exhibit a minimum of 5 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig and fruit from each species collected.

Forestry Collection: (Choose either A or B) This class is open to those exhibiting either for the first or second time at the state fair. A. Exhibit a minimum of 20 different leaves (including 10 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees. B. Exhibit a minimum of 10 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new leaf, twig and fruit specimens.

Forestry Collection: (Choose either A or B) This class is open to those exhibiting either for the third or fourth time at the state fair. A. Exhibit a minimum of 30 different leaves (including 10 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected from native Kansas trees. B. Exhibit a minimum of 15 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 5 new leaf, twig and fruit specimens.

Class 15004 Forestry Collection: (Choose either A or B) This class is open to those exhibiting the fifth time or more at the state fair. A. Exhibit a minimum of 40 different leaves (including 20 new specimens) from native Kansas trees. Exhibit can include non-native leaves in addition to the required number of leaf specimens collected

from native Kansas trees. B. Exhibit a minimum of 20 native Kansas trees showing leaf, twig, and fruit from each species collected. This exhibit must include 10 new leaf, twig and fruit specimens. . .

How A Tree Grows

Class 15005

Notebook: Entry may include a project notebook with 10 or moreseeds collected with pictures showing a germination study or a mounting of a thin section of wood cut from the end of a log or top of stem labeled with information such as kind of wood and age of tree whenart or exhibited an illustration of how a treegrows.

Tree Appreciation

Class 15006

Notebook: Entry may include research or reporting project notebook with no more than 10 pages based on the exhibitor's selected tree. Exhibit must be a different species of tree each year. This notebook may include sketches, drawings, pictures, a story, or any other things which will help tell about the tree you have selected.

Growing and Protecting Trees

Class 15007

Display/Notebook: Entry requires a display, or project notebook, telling about project and pictures before, during, & after planting seedlings, a container tree, or a balled and burlapped tree. Maximum tri-fold size is 3' x 4'.

Tree Culture

Class 15008

Display/Notebook: Entry requires a display, or project notebook, showing your project work and includes pictures of before, during and after wood lot improvement, Maximum tri-fold size is 3' x 4'.

How Forests Serve Us

Class 15009

Entry may include collected wood samples (all or partial) and essay. Wood sample display to be mounted on poster board or any stiff material no larger than a 3' x 4' tri-fold. Essay should be displayed in a covered binder.

Educational/Creative Exhibit

Class 15010 Entry must be directly related to tree identification or Forestry. Type of exhibit is open (notebook, poster, collection box, etc.) given a maximum tri-fold size of 3' x 4'. Care should be taken to use durable materials that will withstand State Fair conditions. This is a good class to exhibit an unusual collection..

SHOOTING SPORTS

Special Rules for Shooting Sports:

- 1. Open to all 4-H members who enrolled and participated in no less than 9 hours of safety training during the currentyear.
- 2. Educational displays must follow copyright laws. Take care to select durable materials. No "live" ammunition containing propellant or explosive powders may be used inany display! Artistic substitutes must be used in lieu of powder and "live" ammunition. Neither the Logan County Extension Office nor the Fair Board are liable for the loss or damage of any personal property included as part of a display.
- 3. Please see pages 47 for rules on booths, posters and notebooks.
- 4.4-H'ers are not allowed to receive premium money from Shooting projects due to NCAA rules and regulations but may receive medals, trophies, or other awards.
- 5.BB Rules: Current NRA Rule Book will be used. All shooters will shoot 10 shot bulls in each of four positions.
- 6. Air Rifle Rules current National Standard 3 positions willbe used. All shooters will shoot 20 bulls in each of the three
- 7. Air Pistol: Juniors and Intermediates may shoot two handed. Seniors shoot one handed. Shooters will shoot 40 shots at ten meters for a possible score of 400 on bulls. Then twenty shots on paper or metal silhouettes.
- 8. Small Bore Rifle: Participants must have 2 years air rifleexperience before participating in small bore rifle. Exhibitors will have 10 shots in each of the 3 positions.
 - 9. Small Bore Pistol: 4-H'ers 14 and up only are eligible to shoot small bore pistol.

Slow fire: 4 strings of 10 on B2 target

Timed fire: 2 strings of 5 shots, 20 seconds on B3target.

- 10.Muzzleloader: Must have 2 years air rifle experience before participating in muzzleloader.
 - 50 yard single bull. 2 per bull. 10 rounds. 20 min.
 - 25 yard haffner animal, 2 per bull, 10 rounds, 20 minutes. 25 yard bottle target, 2 per bull, 10 rounds, 20 minutes.
- 11: Archery: Each age class will be divided by bow typeused. FITA: Jr and Intermediate: 12 arrows at 20 and 30 meters. Sr: 12 arrows at 30 and 40 meters.


